Survey Questionnaire

The survey instrument used for this study was designed to provide a structured, yet flexible discussion regarding environmental issues in Hawai'i. In particular, the survey instrument was designed to collect general information on the state of Hawai'i's environment and possible solutions, as well as gather more specific recommendations on the best ways for Hau'oli Mau Loa Foundation to proceed with an environmental grantmaking strategy.

In collaboration with Foundation staff, forty-eight experts in a wide range of environmental disciplines were identified and surveyed. The interviewees represent a variety of stakeholders including government, not-for-profit, current Foundation grantees, physical scientists, social scientists, practitioners, researchers, and other grantmakers. Survey participants were given the survey instrument in advance of the interviews and thus were given a chance to review questions and were directed to the Foundation website for further information. The survey instrument is presented here in order to provide insight into the type of information gathered.

- 3) Hau'oli Mau Loa Foundation is committed to the children and youth of Hawai'i. What role can children and youth play within environmental initiatives?
- 4) Hau'oli Mau Loa Foundation has roughly an \$850,000 annual budget for environmental grants and is interested in issues related to land conservation, marine conservation, or climate change adaptation. What would be your primary recommendation on how the foundation can best impact environmental outcomes in Hawai'i with this level of giving?
